Breast Cancer Awareness

Breast cancer is a disease in which malignant cells form in the tissues of the breast and can affect both women and men. Cancer grows when a cell's DNA is damaged. The damage can be genetic or environmental and lifestyle factors. Genetic factors are inherited or passed down from parent to child through genes.

1 in 8 women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. In 2024, an estimated 310,720 women and 2,800 men will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer.

When caught early, the survival rate is 99%. Early detection and treatment methods have significantly increased over the years. Early detection includes doing monthly breast self-exams and scheduling regular clinic breast exams and mammograms.

The risk of recurrence depends on the type and staging of the initial breast cancer. Typically, the highest risk of recurrence is during the first few years after treatment and decrease over time.

There are five treatment options: surgery, radiation, chemotherapy, hormone therapy, and targeted therapies. Some are local, targeting just the area around the tumor. Others are systematic, targeting your whole body with cancer fighting agents.

Awareness of facts and statistics are important for individuals to make informed decisions about their health.

Liver Cancer Awareness

Liver cancer happens when the cells develop mutations in their DNA. A cell's DNA is the material that provides instructions for every chemical process in your body. DNA mutations cause changes in these instructions, which results in that cell growing out of control and forming a tumor – a mass of cancerous cells. Sometimes liver cancer happens in people with no underlying diseases and it's not clear what causes it.

Factors that increase the risk of liver cancer include: Chronic infection with Hepatitis B or C; Cirrhosis; inherited liver disease, hemochromatosis and Wilson's disease; Diabetes; nonalcoholic fatty liver disease; exposure to aflatoxins (aflatoxins are poisons produced by molds that grow on crops) and excessive alcohol consumption.

Early signs and symptoms of liver cancer are: losing weight without trying, loss of appetite, upper abdominal pain, nausea & vomiting, general weakness & fatigue, abdominal swelling, white chalky stools and jaundice.

Treatments include: removing the tumor, liver transplant, chemotherapy, radiation, immunotherapy and palliative care.
